Darts in Carrigallen and surrounding towns Harry Orwell

DARTS IN LEITRIM back in the '60s was a very popular game especially in John Joe Dolan's West End Inn in Carrigallen. Back in 1964 the Smithwicks Beer Perpetual Trophy was presented to the Carrigallen Darts League. At that point, John Joe Dolan's became the venue to hold the longest seasonal darts tournament ever held in Ireland. The very first name on the cup was Micheal McCusker. In later years I won it myself on four occasions between 1990 and 1998. In the earlier days, my good friend Johnny Fyfe won it on five occasions, once in each decade. During this time there was darts being played in every pub in every town in Leitrim. In some establishments there could be up to three teams playing several times a week. Back then it was brass darts with feather flights and metal stems, now its tungsten darts with plastic flights and stems. Darts night in John Joe Dolans was on Wedensday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday for many years. Without a doubt John Joe Dolans was the home of darts. Regulars were Alan Taylor, Jackie McManus—sons J P & Andrew and father Jack, Tony Fahy, John Murray, Mary McNaboe, Noel Reilly, Gerry McIntyre, Eamon & Mary Donoghue, Liam Grimes, Eamon Gray, Eugene Doherty and sons Michael & Gene, John Reilly, Michael Hackett, Kyle Humphreys, Larry Williams, Gary O'Reilly, Joe Kiernan, Michael Smith, Joe & Kathleen McHugh—it's an endless list!

In 1979 I was asked to play on a team for John Joe's consisting of Johnny Fyfe, Joe Kiernan, Benny Brady, Willie Johnson and myself. We entered many competitions in the local area, some of which were in establishments such as: Jim O'Briens and Mckeons of Mohill, Top Of The Hill in Annaduff, The Railway Bar in Dromod and McKeons in Cloone. There were many others too. We won many events, John Joe was very proud of us and used to come along in his Mark 4 Ford Cortina to offer us support.

In may of 2007, John Joe Dolan decided to call it a day and said "time gentlemen please", for the last time. It was, to say the least, the end of an era. On the night I thought of my original darts team at that time, three of them had passed. All that remained was Johnny Fyfe, who has sadly passed on since, and myself. It was a sad night in ways but also a happy night in others as there were many people there. On the night a special occasion took place where Johnny Fyfe presented the 1964 cup back to John Joe Dolan for the last time. Apart from that it was also a night to remember the goodness of John joe, his wife Anna May and his family, and how that all of us, not just the dart throwers, everyone that stood in the premises, was treated with respect and made to feel very welcome. Two years ago John Joe passed.

Just lately i was presented with Johnny Fyfe's tournament darts and a hand-made box that was presented to Johnny by a Lancashire Fisherman. I am still throwing his darts with pride today and I am pleased to say that, after 40 years I'm still part of a darts team that in November 2019, won the knock out cup at the Lavey Inn in Cavan.

It was a beautiful era for darts, one which we will hardly experience again. As for me, every time I win something, I always pay tribute to the memory of John Joe Dolan and Johnny Fyfe along with all my teammates from the 70's. Only for them all, I would not have had my wonderful success in the world of the game of darts.
